My life situation is largely reflected in the selection of the games on my list. You'll see games that are very good for two player and that don't take too much time, rank high on my list.

Well, and the fact that I don't really own that many board games (around 20 currently), because I don't like to hoard games without playing them properly. What I buy, I buy with the intention of playing it a lot.

Here is the list:

#### Number 7: Cuba

First, a confession. I only played Cuba once, but I absolutely loved it. It's an econonomic worker-placement type of game, set in a pre-revolution Cuba. You manage a plantation, produce rum, tobacco and other things, trying to sell them to ships at the highest price possible.

We played it as a 2 player game and my girfriend wasn't overly excited, so I didn't push this one further.

I'm saving Cuba for when my group starts playing again, but I have played it's simplified brother, <u>Santiago de Cuba</u> a lot more. It suited mine and my girflriend's playing habits more.

#### Number 6: Kahuna

<u>Kahuna</u> is another game, right up our alley. Short and simple 2 player game, but still strategic enough that your choices matter. Oh, and the lovely exotic beach theme makes you feel just like on a vacation in the middle of the Pacific ocean.

# Number 5: Settlers of Catan

You don't forget your first love and <u>Catan</u> is mine. I haven't played it in years (except digital versions), but we played the hell out of this with our group. Memories of shouting, trying to get rid of those pesky sheep will never fade. O

# Number 2: Mage Knight

Epic single player puzzle (we did try it with 2, but she didn't really enjoy it) was long time my favorite game. <u>Mage Knight</u> is almost a perfect game for me. Full of meaningful choices and analysis, lovely theme and just the right amount of random factor.

It's arguably one of the best single player experiences, but for me it does come with a flaw. I takes a lot of time to complete a game – I'm talking about minumum of three to four hours.

You can imagine when was the last time I had so much free time, so unfortuntely Mage Knight is not on the table as often as I would want.
